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About the Conference

The 13th International Conference on Population Geographies (ICPG) will be held in Nanjing, China from 23 to 26 June 2026. Convened biennially, ICPG is one of the most influential international conferences in population geography and spatial population research, providing a high-level platform for scholarly exchange and collaboration. The ICPG International Organizing Committee is a highly experienced team of leading population geographers, chaired by Professor Darren Smith (Loughborough University).

Against a backdrop of deepening global integration intertwined with uncertainty and transformation, population issues remain central to sustainable development worldwide. Population geography is increasingly vital for addressing contemporary challenges—from advancing the UN 2030 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and responding to climate change, to promoting coordinated regional development and reducing socio-spatial inequality. The field continues to extend its frontiers at both macro and micro scales, spanning population change and distribution, resources and environmental carrying capacity, migration and mobility, and spatio-temporal behaviour and social interaction, offering a distinctive perspective on population dynamics and spatial processes.

ICPG 2026 is co-hosted by Nanjing University and the Geographical Society of China, and organized by the School of Geography and Ocean Science, Nanjing University, in collaboration with partner organizations including the IGU Commission on Population Geography and the Population Geography Committee of the Geographical Society of China. With the theme “**Population Geographies in an Era of Demographic Transition**”, ICPG 2026 has received strong interest from academic and research communities worldwide. Following review by the Organizing Committee, 34 thematic parallel sessions have been confirmed, and we now invite abstract submissions. Scholars and postgraduate students from around the world are warmly welcome to join us to discuss cutting-edge issues in global and regional population change, share new research, and advance the field of population geography

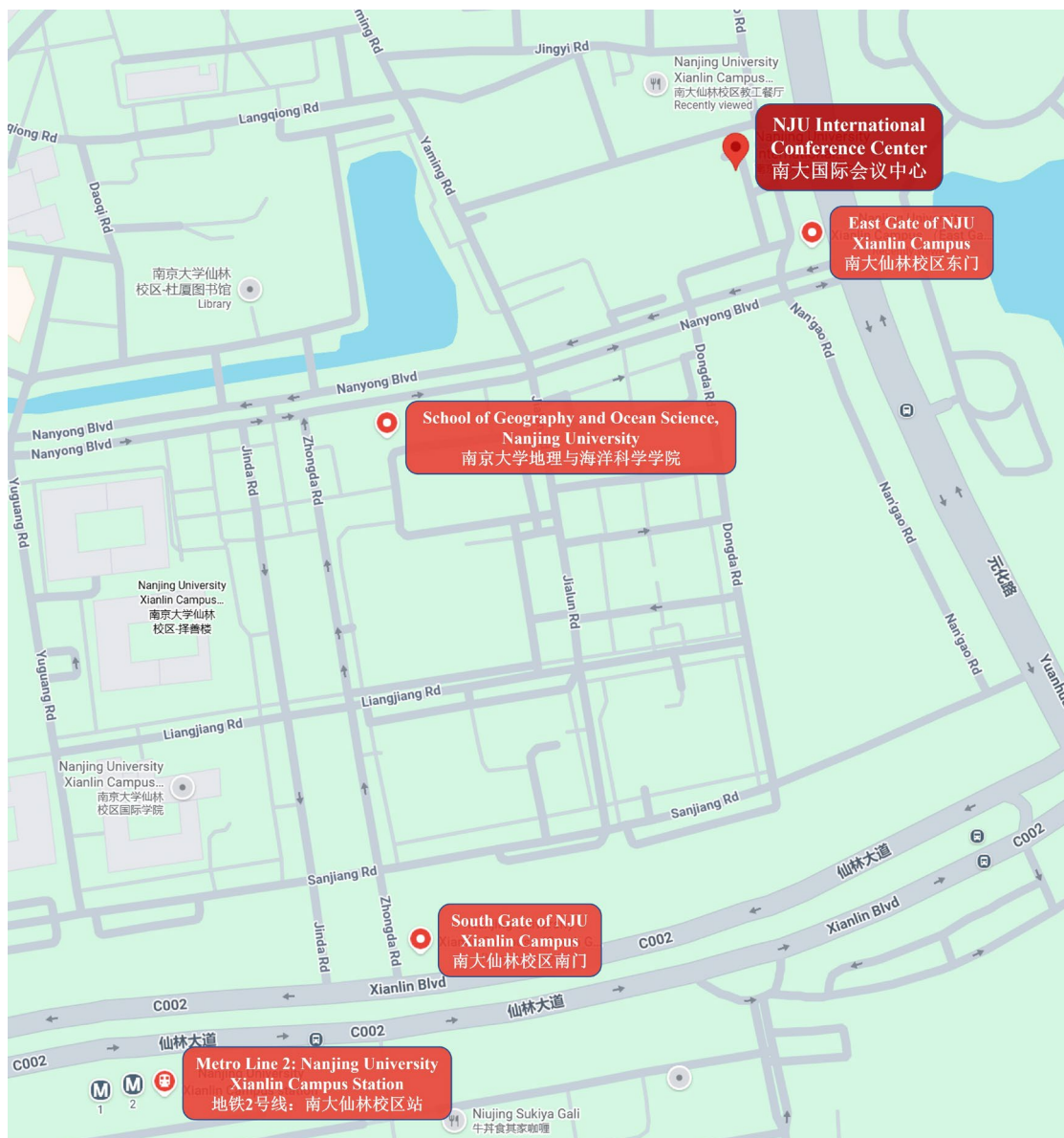

Keynote Speakers



Anthony G.O. Yeh, Member of the Chinese Academy of Sciences and the Hong Kong Academy of Sciences, Fellow of TWAS (The World Academy of Sciences), and Fellow of the Academy of Social Sciences UK, is the Chan To-Hann Professor in Urban Planning and Design, Chair Professor of the Department of Urban Planning and Design, and Director of the Centre of Urban Studies and Urban Planning at the University of Hong Kong. His main areas of specialization are urban development and planning in Hong Kong, China, and Southeast Asia, and the application of geographic information systems (GIS) as planning support systems for smart cities. He received the UN-HABITAT Lecture Award in 2008 for his outstanding contribution to research and practice in the field of human settlements, and his projects have won multiple gold and silver medals at the Geneva International Exhibition of Inventions (2018, 2023, 2024) and the Hong Kong ICT Awards (2022, 2025). He has published over 30 books and more than 180 papers in international journals and book chapters. He has served as President of the Asia GIS Association, Founding President of the Hong Kong GIS Association, and Chairman of the Geographic Information Science Commission of the International Geographical Union (IGU).



Stewart Fotheringham is the Krafft Professor of Spatial Data Science in the Department of Geography and Director of the Spatial Data Science Center (SDSC) in the College of Social Sciences and Public Policy at Florida State University. His research focuses on analyzing spatial datasets using statistical, mathematical, and computational methods. He is well known in the fields of spatial interaction modeling and local statistical analysis, the latter as one of the developers of multiscale geographically weighted regression (MGWR). He is a member of the U.S. National Academy of Sciences and Academia Europaea and an Academician in the UK Academy of Social Sciences. He is a Fellow of the American Association of Geographers and the University Consortium for GIS, and he has received both a Lifetime Achievement Award and an Honorary Membership from the Chinese Professionals in GIS. He has secured more than \$15 million in funding, published 12 books, and authored over 250 research papers and book chapters. His research has garnered over 50,000 citations, and he was awarded the prestigious Highly Cited Researcher award by Clarivate, which recognized him as "1 in 1,000" highly influential researchers across academia in both 2023 and 2025.



Mei-Po Kwan is Head of Chung Chi College, Choh-Ming Li Professor of Geography and Resource Management, and Director of the Institute of Space and Earth Information Science at the Chinese University of Hong Kong. She is a Guggenheim Fellow and a Fellow of the World Academy of Sciences (TWAS), the U.K. Academy of Social Sciences, the Hong Kong Academy of Science, the AAAS, the American Association of Geographers (AAG), the Royal Geographical Society (U.K.), and the Geographical Society of China. She has received numerous prestigious honors, including the AAG Distinguished Scholarship Honors, the Anderson Medal of Honors in Applied Geography, the Wilbanks Prize, the Stanley Brunn Award, and the CPGIS Lifetime Achievement Award. Kwan has published over 580 journal articles, books, and book chapters, secured over USD 68.8 million in research grants, and delivered more than 420 keynote and invited lectures in over 20 countries. She served as an editor of *Annals of the American Association of Geographers* for 12 years. She has made groundbreaking contributions to environmental health, human mobility, smart cities, and GIScience, and discovered the uncertain geographic context problem (UGCoP) and the neighborhood effect averaging problem (NEAP), driving a paradigm shift in environmental exposure assessment.



Lily Kong was appointed President of Singapore Management University in 2019—the first Singaporean to lead the institution and the first Singaporean woman to head a university in Singapore. She also holds the Lee Kong Chian Chair Professorship of Social Sciences. An interdisciplinary scholar with roots in geography, she is widely known for her research on urban transformations and social and cultural change in Asian cities. An award-winning researcher and teacher, Professor Kong has received numerous international honors, including a British Academy Fellowship, a Commonwealth Fellowship, a Fulbright Fellowship, a Geographical Society of China Fellowship, the Robert Stoddard Award from the Association of American Geographers, the Victoria Medal from the Royal Geographical Society (with the Institute of British Geographers), and the SR Nathan Fellowship. She is consistently ranked in the top 1–2% in her field in Stanford's citation impact studies. She has also been awarded an honorary degree by Loughborough University.



Cindy Fan is Vice Provost for International Studies and Global Engagement and Professor of Geography at UCLA. As Senior International Officer, she provides strategic leadership for the university's international partnerships and agreements, represents UCLA in global forums, and oversees 22 interdisciplinary research centers and 8 degree programs within the International Institute. Dr. Fan received her Ph.D. from The Ohio State University. Internationally recognized for her research on migration, split households, gender, and regional development in China, she has published extensively, including the pioneering book *China on the Move*. She has received the UCLA Distinguished Teaching Award, the Distinguished Scholar Award from the American Association of Geographers (AAG), an American Council on Education Fellowship, major grants from the Mellon Foundation, the Henry Luce Foundation, and the National Science Foundation, and an honorary Doctor of Laws from the University of Bristol. Dr. Fan is an elected member of the National Academy of International Education.



Jinhong Ding is a Professor at the Institute of Population Research, East China Normal University. He previously served as Director of the Population Geography Committee of the Geographical Society of China; Director of the Population, Resources and Environment Committee of the China Population Association; Deputy Director of the Department of Geography at East China Normal University; Director of the Institute of Population Research; and Dean of the School of Social Development. Prof. Ding has long engaged in theoretical and policy research on population migration, urbanization, marriage, and fertility. He has published over 150 academic papers and received numerous provincial and ministerial awards for outstanding academic achievements. Currently, he serves as Director of the Academic Committee of the School of Social Development at East China Normal University, President of the Shanghai Population Association, and Vice President of the China Population Association.



Dr. Helen Bao is Professor of Urban Economics and Public Policy in the Department of Land Economy and a Fellow in Land Economy at Newnham College, University of Cambridge. She is also Deputy Head of Department and Director of the Lab of Interdisciplinary Spatial Analysis (LISA) at the University of Cambridge. After completing her Ph.D. in Statistics at City University of Hong Kong, she joined the University of Cambridge in 2006. Helen's research focuses on government policies and interventions that facilitate market operations and mitigate market failures in urban settings, such as sustainable urbanisation and housing affordability. On the technical front, she specialises in applying behavioural insights and hedonic price modelling in land and housing markets. Her new book, *Behavioural Economic Analysis of Institutional Changes: Lessons Learned from China's Land System Reforms*, pushes the research frontier of behavioural urban studies. She has published extensively on the application of behavioural insights in real estate markets in *Urban Studies*, *Regional Studies*, *Land Use Policy*, *Housing Studies*, *Journal of Real Estate Finance and Economics*, *Cities*, and *Transportation Research Part F: Traffic Psychology and Behaviour*, among others. Her research has received funding from the Economic and Social Research Council (UK) and the National Natural Science Foundation of China. She is an Associate Editor of *Cities* and an editorial board member of key journals in urban studies, such as *Land Use Policy*.



Elin Charles-Edwards is an Associate Professor in Human Geography at The University of Queensland, where she also serves as Director of the Queensland Centre for Population Research. A population geographer and demographer, her research focuses on the patterns, drivers, and consequences of population mobility and migration across multiple spatial and temporal scales. Her work has been widely published in leading international journals and edited volumes in population geography and demography. She holds a Bachelor of Arts and a Ph.D. from The University of Queensland. Her research has informed population policy and planning through sustained collaboration with government agencies and stakeholders. She is President of the Australian Population Association and has provided extensive academic service through editorial roles, professional leadership, and contributions to national advisory bodies.



Hengyu Gu is an Assistant Professor and Senior Research Fellow at the School of Geography and Ocean Science, Nanjing University. He received his PhD in Economics from Peking University and was a government-sponsored joint PhD student at the University of Chicago. His research focuses on population geography, talent geography, and regional development, particularly the transition from demographic dividends to talent dividends in China. He has published more than 80 papers as first or corresponding author in leading journals, including PNAS and Annals of the American Association of Geographers, and has authored two monographs. He is a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society and serves as Associate Editor of *Applied Spatial Analysis and Policy*, with editorial roles in several international journals. His research has been supported by major national and provincial grants, and has received several academic awards, including the Youth Achievement Award of the Ministry of Education Award for Outstanding Achievements in Humanities and Social Sciences and the First Prize of the Jiangsu Provincial Award for Outstanding Achievements in Philosophy and Social Sciences.

keynote Panel Moderator



Darren Smith is a Professor of Geography at Loughborough University, whose research sits at the intersection of Population Studies, Urban Studies, Rural Studies, and Migration Studies. Over the past four decades, his work has explored the deepening connections between changing places and social conflicts among diverse groups and institutions, contributing to the rise of more exclusive, segregated, and transient societies. He is best known for coining the term "studentification" to describe the transformation processes in university towns and cities, as well as the resistance to growing student populations and the expansion of higher education. To date, he has investigated studentification across the UK, Ireland, North America, Australia, and China. He is a Fellow of the UK Academy of Social Sciences and currently serves as Editor-in-Chief of both *Population, Space and Place* and the *Journal of Rural Studies*. He also chairs the Commission on Population Geography of the International Geographical Union (IGU) and the Organising Committee of the International Conference of Population Geographies (ICPG).

Conference Transportation Guide

Routes from major transport hubs:

1. From Pudong International Airport

- Take Metro Line 2 to Shanghai Hongqiao Railway Station, then take a high-speed train to Nanjing South Railway Station, where the subsequent route is the same as the one from Nanjing South Railway Station to Nanjing University Xianlin Campus.

2. From Nanjing Lukou International Airport

- **By Metro:** Take Metro Line S1 to Nanjing South Railway Station, transfer to Line 3 to Daxinggong Station, then transfer to Line 2 and travel directly to Nanjing University Xianlin Campus Station.
- **By Taxi:** ~60 km, approx. CNY 90-130, 40–60 min.

Note: All taxi routes drop off at the East Gate of NJU Xianlin Campus.

3. From Nanjing South Railway Station

- **By Metro:** Take Metro Line 3 to Daxinggong Station, then transfer to Line 2 to Nanjing University Xianlin Campus Station.

Yixing Purple Clay Culture and Southern Jiangnan Landscape

26th June, 2026

Overview

This one-day field trip to Yixing, Jiangsu Province, introduces the cultural landscape, craft heritage, industrial transformation and environmental regeneration of one of China's most distinctive ceramic cities. Known as the “**Chinese Pottery Capital**,” Yixing has long been associated with purple clay, or zisha, a locally embedded material that connects geology, skilled craftsmanship, tea culture, regional identity and everyday social life. From early ceramic production and literati tea culture to contemporary museums, creative districts and resort landscapes, **Yixing offers a compact view of how historical traditions are continually reshaped in modern regional development.**

The itinerary begins with the historical depth of Yixing ceramics, continues through the adaptive reuse of a former zisha factory, and then moves into the karst caves and restored quarry landscape of Yixing. These sites together reveal how local resources, craft communities, labour traditions, tourism development and ecological restoration have shaped the contemporary landscape of southern Jiangnan.

Site Introductions

China Yixing Ceramic Museum

China Yixing Ceramic Museum is an important institution for understanding the long history of ceramic production in Yixing and the wider Jiangnan region. Located in Dingshu Town, the historical core of Yixing's ceramic industry, the museum presents a broad sequence of ceramic development from early pottery to contemporary ceramic art. Its collections include Neolithic sand-tempered pottery, glazed pottery from the Han Dynasty, celadon from the Jin dynasties, Jun-style pottery from the Song and Yuan dynasties, and purple clay works from the Ming and Qing dynasties.

The museum places Yixing ceramics within a long relationship between local materials, craft knowledge and social life. Purple clay teapots are especially significant because their production depends on both the geological qualities of local clay and the highly refined skills of craftsmen. Over time, these objects became closely connected with tea drinking, literati taste, collecting practices and regional cultural identity. The visit to the museum and the optional hands-on experience provide a direct encounter with the

techniques and cultural meanings of Yixing purple clay, including clay preparation, shaping, forming and surface treatment.



YiXing Zisha Second Factory

YiXing Zisha Second Factory is a representative site of industrial heritage renewal in contemporary Yixing. Originally built in the early 1980s, the factory is located at the southern foot of Huanglong Mountain in Dingshu Town, an area closely associated with purple clay resources and ceramic production. The former factory once formed part of a broader state-owned ceramic industrial system, linking raw material extraction, workshop production, workers' communities and regional markets.

As industrial structures changed, the factory gradually lost its original production function. Some workshops were converted into private studios and commercial spaces, while others remained underused or fragmented. Recent renovation has transformed the site into a cultural and creative district that combines industrial memory, ceramic art, commercial activity and tourism. Rather than erasing the former factory fabric, the renewal strategy preserves existing structures and introduces new design elements through limited intervention.

The renovated site brings together old workshops, ceramic-brick facades, preserved industrial equipment, riverside spaces, creative studios and public gathering areas. These elements create a layered environment in which the memory of production is reinterpreted through cultural consumption and everyday leisure. The factory landscape therefore records a broader shift from industrial manufacture to heritage-led redevelopment, while keeping Yixing's zisha tradition visible in both material form and spatial experience.



Shanjuan Cave Scenic Area

Shanjuan Cave Scenic Area represents another important dimension of Yixing's landscape. Located in the southwestern hills of Yixing, the cave is a typical karst cave system with a geological history that can be traced back to the Carboniferous period. The cave contains stalactites, stalagmites, stone curtains and underground streams, forming a limestone landscape shaped by long-term dissolution and underground water activity. It consists of several connected sections, including upper, middle, lower and water caves.

The cultural significance of Shanjuan Cave is closely tied to the legend of Shanjuan, an ancient recluse said to have rejected political office and chosen a life close to nature. Since the Tang and Song dynasties, the cave has attracted scholars, poets and travellers, leaving behind literary associations and inscriptions that link natural scenery with ideas of retreat, moral cultivation and landscape appreciation. In the twentieth century, the

development of Shanjuan Cave and nearby cave landscapes also marked an early stage in the modernization of cave tourism in China.

Today, Shanjuan Cave combines geological scenery, historical imagination and tourism infrastructure. Its landscape shows how natural landforms become culturally meaningful through stories, routes, inscriptions, accessibility and visitor practices. The cave is not only a physical formation, but also a long-standing cultural destination within the mountainous landscape of southern Yixing.



Yixing Inlong Narada Resort Hotel

Yixing Inlong Narada Resort Hotel is located in the Yangxian Ecological Tourism Resort Area and forms part of a larger resort complex developed around former quarry and mining landscapes. The project transforms a disused quarry into a leisure and wellness environment centred on blue quarry lakes, dramatic cliff forms, hilltop accommodation and landscape-oriented public spaces.

The site reflects a broader process of post-mining landscape reuse in the Yangtze River Delta. Former extractive terrain has been reshaped into a space of recreation, residence, visual experience and regional tourism. The steep quarry walls and lake surfaces, once associated with resource extraction and industrial disturbance, now function as distinctive landscape assets within a resort setting.

This transformation connects environmental repair with new patterns of mobility and leisure. The restored quarry landscape shows how ecological rehabilitation, tourism investment and rural development can converge in contemporary Jiangnan.



Summary

This field trip presents Yixing through the intertwined histories of material resources, craftsmanship, industrial change, natural landforms and landscape regeneration. China Yixing Ceramic Museum introduces the historical depth of Yixing ceramics and purple clay culture. YiXing Zisha Second Factory demonstrates how former industrial spaces can be reactivated through heritage, design and cultural consumption. Shanjuan Cave Scenic Area links karst geomorphology with literary tradition and tourism development. Yixing Inlong Narada Resort Hotel shows how a former quarry landscape can be transformed through ecological restoration and resort-led redevelopment.

Together, these sites reveal Yixing as a landscape shaped by clay, water, stone, labour, mobility and cultural memory. The route moves from ancient ceramic traditions and long-established landscape imaginaries to contemporary forms of industrial reuse, ecological repair and leisure-oriented development. The excursion offers a grounded view of how traditional craft, industrial heritage, natural scenery and contemporary tourism continue to reshape the social and spatial identity of southern Jiangnan.

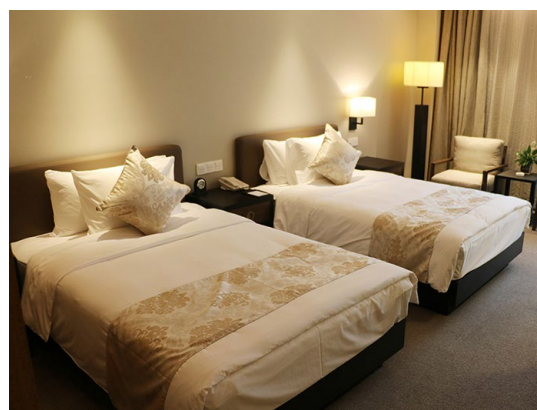
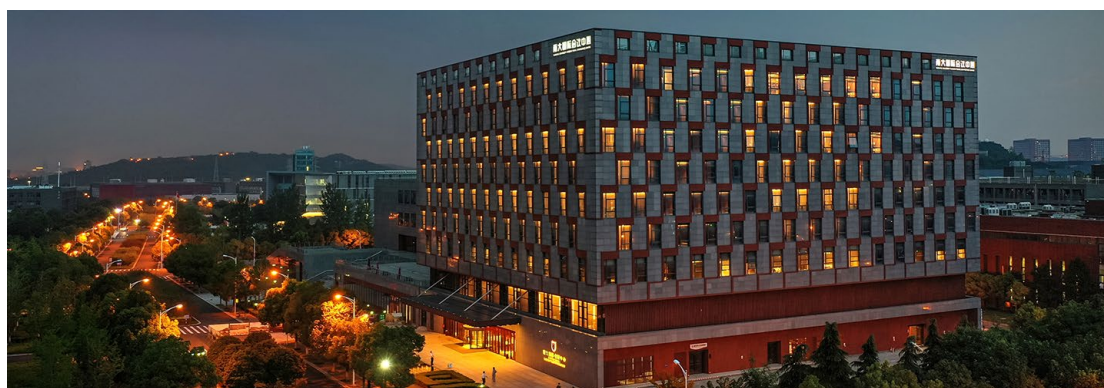

School of Geography and Ocean Science, Nanjing University

The School of Geography and Ocean Science at Nanjing University traces its origins to one of the earliest geography programs in China. It comprises four departments: Physical Geography, Land Resources and Tourism, Geographic Information Science, and Coastal and Ocean Sciences. Since its founding, the School has emphasized field investigation, laboratory analysis, computational modeling, and international collaboration in its teaching and research. It is home to the National Key Discipline of Physical Geography, as well as three Jiangsu Provincial Key Disciplines: Cartography and Geographic Information Systems, Land Use and Planning (Human Geography), and Marine Geology. The School has developed distinctive strengths in global change, environmental evolution, geomorphological processes, environmental and ecological remote sensing, coastal zone environments and resources, regional sustainable development, and tourism geography, earning wide recognition in domestic and international academic circles.

Currently, the School offers comprehensive undergraduate, master's, and doctoral programs in geography, along with a postdoctoral research station. It also serves as a National Base for Basic Scientific Research and Teaching Talent in Geography. The School has 133 faculty and staff members, including one academician of China Academy of Sciences, eight national-level leading talents, 11 national-level young talents, 39 professors, 27 associate professors, and 11 tenure-track assistant professors, with approximately 1,000 undergraduate and graduate students enrolled. It hosts numerous high-level research platforms, including the Collaborative Innovation Center for South China Sea Studies (National "2011 Plan"), the Key Laboratory of Coast and Island Development of the Ministry of Education, the Key Laboratory of Satellite Mapping Technology and Application of the National Administration of Surveying, Mapping and Geoinformation, the Mount Huangshan National Park Ecosystem Field Scientific Observation and Research Station of the Ministry of Education, the Frontier Science Center for Critical Earth Material Cycling of the Ministry of Education, and the Jiangsu Provincial Key Laboratory of Geographic Information Technology.
